RESCUE FROM OPIOID OVERDOSE



Naloxone (also known as Narcan®) can reverse the effects of opioid overdose.

Look for Signs of an Opioid Overdose



Check: Hard to wake, heavy nodding



Listen: Slow or shallow breathing (1 breath every 5 seconds); gurgling/ choking sounds



Look: Bluish or grayish lips, fingernails, skin



Touch: Clammy sweaty skin

Naloxone Saves Lives

Naloxone is **SAFE** and available as an over the counter (OTC) medication.

Naloxone can reverse the effects of an overdose from opioids, including:

Heroin Morphine Fentanyl Methadone

Hydrocodone (Vicodin®)
Oxycodone (OxyContin®)

Codeine Hydromorphone

Drugs obtained from non-healthcare sources are commonly mixed with fentanyl.This includes pills that look like medications or stimulants like cocaine or methamphetamine.

Naloxone is available in all states.

Naloxone for overdose must be given as a nasal spray or injection by a bystander, as the person overdosing cannot administer it themselves.

How to Get Naloxone

- If you or a family member uses or may be exposed to opioids, you should have naloxone on hand.
- Within the VA, ask your VA provider for a free prescription for naloxone.
- To find naloxone outside the VA, contact your local pharmacist, health department, or community groups. *Many offer it at no cost or for a small fee without a prescription.*
